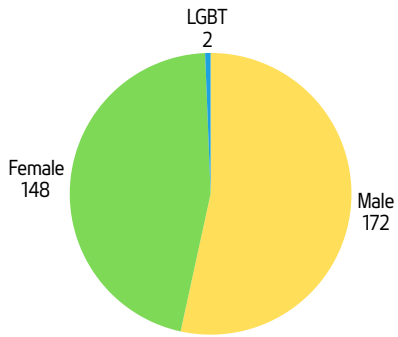
The BF strives to offer humanitarian support to human rights advocates, democracy supporters, refugees, and marginalized communities inside and outside of the country. The efforts encompass supplying resources like food, shelter, financial aid, and medical care, alongside vocational and language training programs. Additionally, the BF aids Burmese migrant communities by partnering with various stakeholders in Mae Sot.

Highlight

- On 6 March, the organization officially changed its name to "Blossom Future." A public announcement was made via the organization's official Facebook page and other social media channels, and an official statement was disseminated to donors, partners, and peer organizations.
- On 2 March, the BF Human Rights (BF-HR) Program released a statement on the airstrike carried out by the military junta against civilians in Pyaung Village, Mindon Township, Magway Region, on 1 March 2026.
- On 9 March, a statement was released regarding the massacre and inhumane treatment of civilians from Kyaung Kone and Yae Twin Kone Villages, Nyaunglebin Township, Bago Region, on 5 March.
- Also on 9 March, BF publicly released a statement on airstrikes by the military junta against civilians in Leikpoke Village, Pinlebu Township, and Ma Yoe Tone Village, Pale Township, Sagaing Region, on 1 March 2026, through its official social media channels.
- On 11 March, BF published a statement on human rights violations, including sexual violence, torture, and religious discrimination, in No. 20 Battalion, Yinmarbin District, Sagaing Region. BF also published a statement on an airstrike targeting a camp in Ann Township, Rakhine State, where prisoners of war detained by the Arakan Army were held. The attack occurred on 8 March and resulted in the deaths of 116 prisoners and injuries to 32 others.
- On 12 March, BF's Human Rights Program published and disseminated a factsheet titled "Aerial Attacks on Civilians: 26 January 2026 to 25 February 2026" as part of its advocacy efforts.
- On 13 March, the BF-HR Program released a statement on an airstrike by the military junta against civilians in Nam Khote and Mya Lae Villages, Bhamo Township, Kachin State, on 10 March 2026.
- On 18 March, the Executive Director was interviewed by a local media outlet.
- On 24 March, BF hosted a visit by officials from IOM and JECCA and held discussions on the human trafficking situation in Mae Sot and along the border.
- On 25 March, BF issued a statement on the airstrike by the military junta targeting a monastery in Ward No. 3, Katha Town, Sagaing Region, on 20 March 2026.

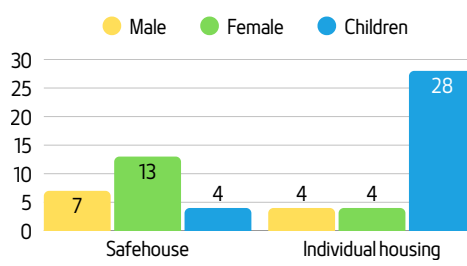
1 Basic Food Program

With the support of the donors, BF provided food to a total of 332 Burmese individuals comprising 172 males, 148 females and 2 LGBTs. Since February 2022, it has provided food of 78,333 units (One-month units) to 46,282 individuals.



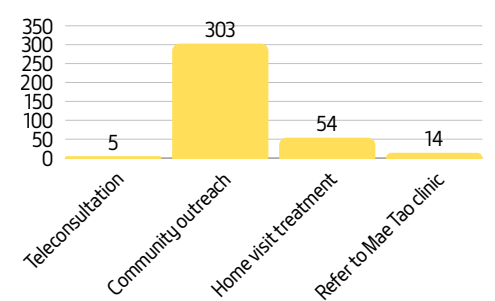
2 Shelter Program

In March, BF provided shelter assistance to 24 newly admitted refugees while 36 individuals with special needs were accommodated in individual housing. This program also supports job facilitation, medical service and vocational trainings. Since April 2021, BF's safe houses program contributed to a total of 3,220 individuals with shelter assistance.



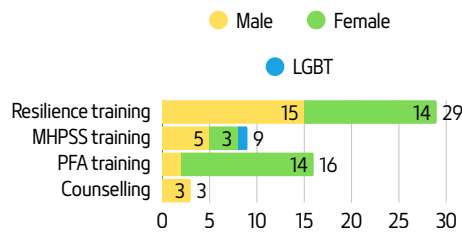
3 Basic Healthcare Program

The program treated 376 patients in March 2026. Since June 2022, NMF's telehealth program has provided free healthcare services to 8,944 Burmese in Mae Sot, which cover 2156 males (24%), 5033 females (56%) and 1755 children (20%).



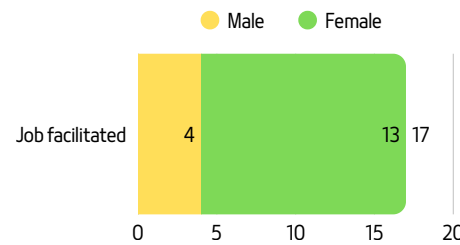
4 MHPSS Program

The program provides counseling to 3 clients, resilience training to 29 individuals, Psychological First Aid (PFA) training to 16 participants, and Mental Health and Psychosocial Support (MHPSS) training to another 9 individuals. Since its commencement in April 2025, a total of 678 individuals were provided with mental health services.



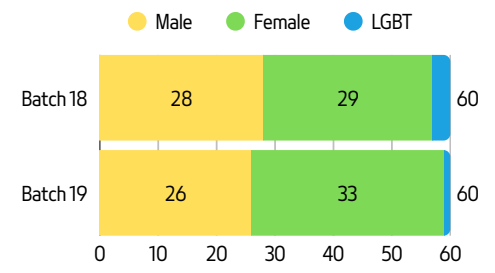
5 Job Facilitation Program

In March, 17 individuals (4 men and 13 women) were supported in finding employment in sewing industries, construction sites and restaurants. Since the program began, a total of 959 people has been assisted in securing jobs, including 433 men, 523 women, and 3 LGBT individuals.



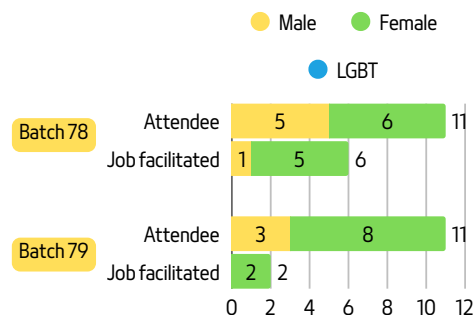
6 Thai Language Training

Thai language trainings batch-18 and batch-19 which commenced in January and February 2026, were delivered to a total of 120 participants (54 males, 62 females and 4 LGBTs). Since March 2022, a total of 711 trainees graduated the Thai language training.



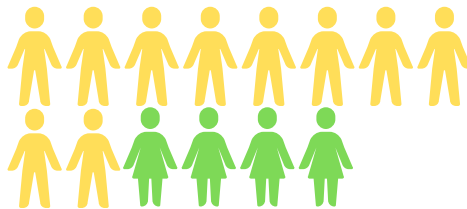
7 Sewing Machine Training

In March, industrial sewing trainings Batch (78) and (79) are delivered to a total of 22 trainees (14 females and 8 males). Since February 2022, there are a total of 79 sewing machine trainings with 808 trainees where 454 got jobs.



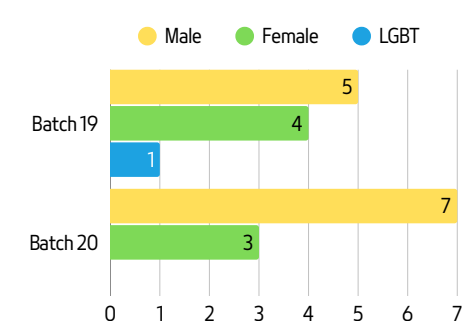
8 Agricultural Training

In March, agricultural training batch-17 was conducted for 14 participants (10 males and 4 females). The program run on a 6-rai plot, growing crops, and were distributed to communities residing in boarding schools, Mae Tao clinic, safehouses and around Mae Sot. Since October 2024, a total of 17 agricultural training sessions has been held with 196 trainees.



9 Computer Training

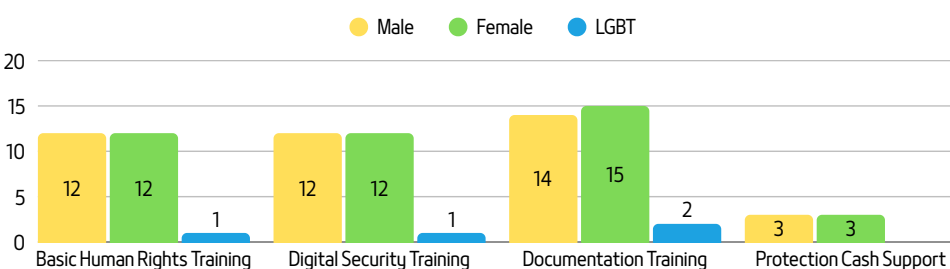
Two basic trainings were delivered to 20 participants including 13 males, 7 females and 1 LGBT in March. Since its commencement in April 2025, a total of 220 individuals were provided with computer training.



10 Human Rights Program

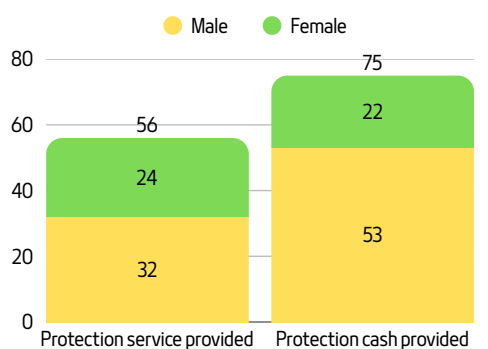
In March, the program has expanded its HR network for documentation works and ground HR activities inside Myanmar with three new CSOs partners. Additionally, the program conducted basic human rights training (together with digital security training), and documentation training for 81 participants. Since its commencement in Feb 2023, a total of 932 participants, 945 participants, 337 participants and 313 participants have joined human rights training, personal data and digital security training, advanced human rights training and documentation training respectively.

11 Protection Program

The program commenced in April 2025, providing protection service to 16 cases (comprising 56 beneficiaries: 32 males and 24 females). Additionally, the program support protection cash support to 75 individuals (53 males and 22 females).
