

Program Overview

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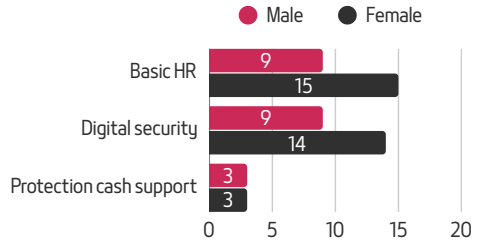
The BF strives to offer humanitarian support to human rights advocates, democracy supporters, refugees, and marginalized communities inside and outside of the country. The efforts encompass supplying resources like food, shelter, financial aid, and medical care, alongside vocational and language training programs. Additionally, the BF aids Burmese migrant communities by partnering with various stakeholders in Mae Sot.

Highlight

- On 9 May, Blossom Future (BF) visited OIA and SAW Foundation regarding the upcoming community support program and future collaboration.
- On 10 May, the Executive Director of BF visited the Rohingya community residing in Mae Sot to assess their socio-economic conditions and needs.
- On 11 May, the HR Program team published and disseminated a factsheet titled “Factsheet for Aerial Attacks on Civilians from 1 April to 30 April 2026” as part of its advocacy efforts.
- On 13 May, the Executive Director met with 11 small-scale farmers who are operating farms supported by the organization. BF also welcomed representatives from Border Health Development Foundation based in Mae Sariang and discussed future collaboration and support.
- On 17 May, BF attended a meeting organized by OIA regarding the unconditional release of Daw Aung San Suu Kyi.
- On 18 and 19 May, BF joined the annual conference of the Burma Medical Association (BMA).
- On 19 May, BF participated in the Migrant Rights Promoting Working Group (MRPWG) monthly meeting. BF also met with representatives from TBC and OIA to review and discuss the current collaboration process.
- On 23 May, BF traveled to Mae La Refugee Camp, the ABSDF camp, and Border Health Development Foundation in Mae Sariang to discuss further assistance and share information on services available from BF.
- On 24 May, BF continued its travel to Mae Hong Son, where it met with the Karenni National Progressive Party (KNPP) and shared information on services available from BF.

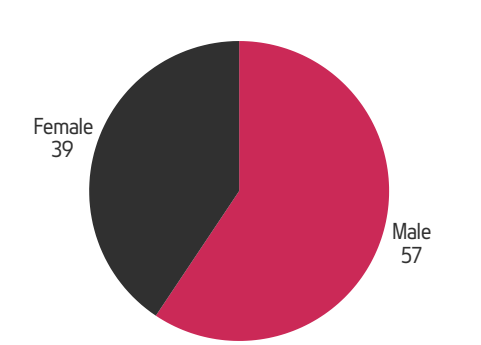
1 Human Rights Program

The program conducted basic human rights and digital security training for 47 participants in May. Since its commencement in Feb 2023, a total of 956 participants, 968 participants, 337 participants and 343 participants have joined human rights training, personal data and digital security training, advanced human rights training and documentation training respectively.



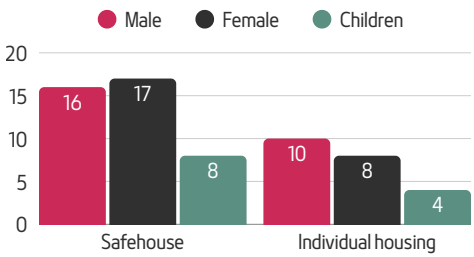
2 Basic Food Program

With the support of the donors, BF provided emergency food to a total of 96 Burmese individuals comprising 57 males and 39 females in May. Since February 2022, it has provided one-month food units to 46,478 individuals.



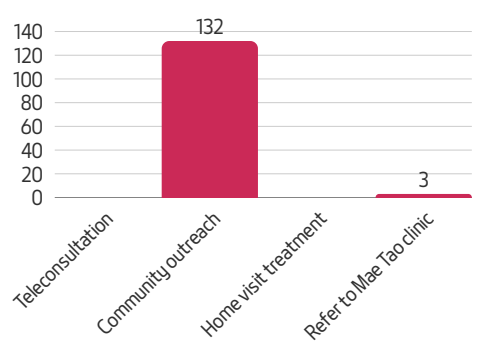
3 Shelter Program

In May, BF provided shelter assistance to 41 newly admitted refugees while 22 individuals with special needs were accommodated in individual housing. This program also supports job facilitation, medical service and vocational trainings. Since April 2021, BF’s safe houses program contributed to a total of 3,457 individuals with shelter assistance.



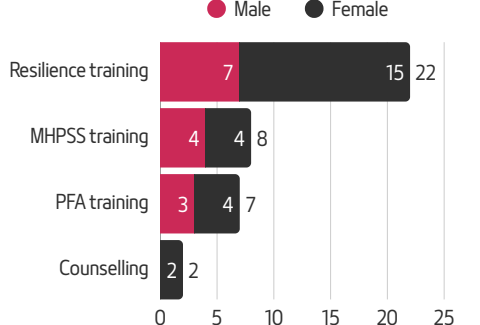
4 Basic Healthcare Program

The program treated 135 patients in May 2026. Since June 2022, BF’s basic healthcare program has provided free healthcare services to 9,379 Burmese in Mae Sot, which cover 2244 males (24%), 5313 females (57%) and 1822 children (19%).



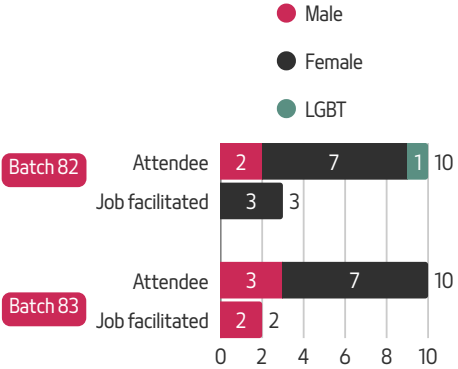
5 MHPSS Program

The program provides counseling to 2 clients, resilience training to 22 individuals, MHPSS awareness session to 8 participants and Psychological First Aid (PFA) training to 7 participants. Since its commencement in April 2025, a total of 748 individuals were provided with mental health services.



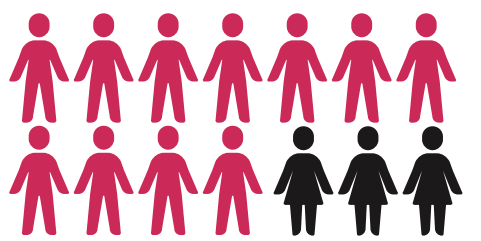
6 Sewing Machine Training

In May, industrial sewing trainings Batch (82) and (83) are delivered to a total of 20 trainees (14 females, 5 males and 1 LGBT). Since February 2022, there are a total of 83 sewing machine trainings with 848 trainees where 484 got jobs.



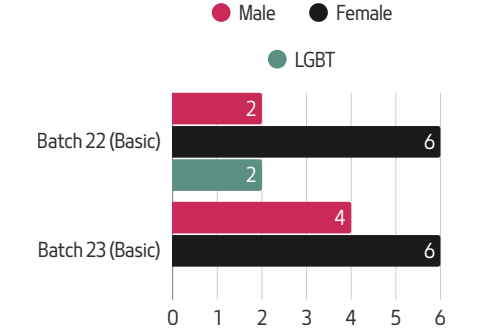
7 Agricultural Training

In May, agricultural training batch-19 was conducted for 14 participants (11 males and 3 females). The program run on a 6-rai plot, growing crops, and were distributed to communities residing in boarding schools, Mae Tao clinic, safehouses and around Mae Sot. Since October 2024, a total of 19 agricultural training sessions has been held with 222 trainees.



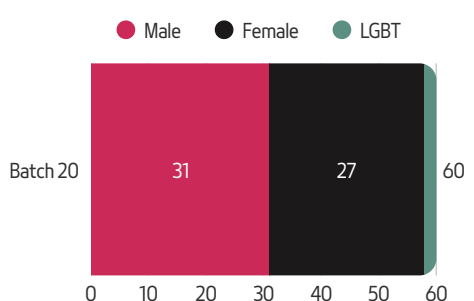
8 Computer Training

Two basic trainings were delivered to 20 participants including 6 males and 12 females in May. Since its commencement in April 2025, a total of 260 individuals were provided with computer training.



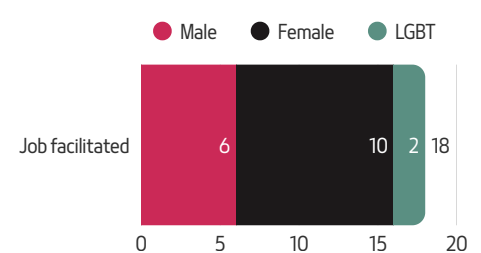
9 Thai Language Training

Thai language training batch-20 which commenced in May 2026, were delivered to a total of 60 participants (31 males, 27 females and 2 LGBTs). Since March 2022, a total of 744 trainees graduated the Thai language training.



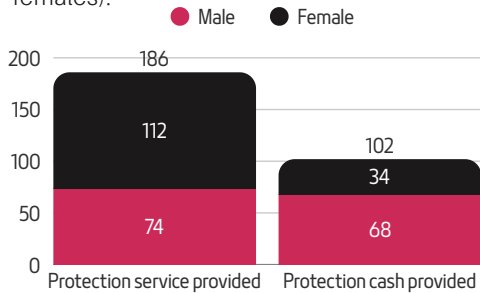
10 Job Facilitation Program

In May, 18 individuals (6 males, 10 females and 2 LGBTs) were supported in finding employment in sewing industries, construction sites and restaurants. Since the program began, a total of 994 people has been assisted in securing jobs, including 447 men, 541 women, and 6 LGBT individuals.



12 Protection Program

The program commenced in April 2025, providing protection service to 18 cases (comprising 186 beneficiaries: 74 males and 112 females). Additionally, the program support protection cash support to 102 individuals (68 males and 34 females).



13 Agricultural Development

Since its commencement in August 2025, a total of 16 Rai of farmlands were supported to 19 households along with basic agricultural tools, fertilizers and set-up cost to run their own farming.
